In fact, I stayed there for several days with a large group of family members.

We have an annual family reunion, and this year it was held at an amazing property in the Northern Midlands, not far from Campbell Town.

The homestead you can see in the photo above has 10 bedrooms and is almost 200-years old.


While 200-years is nothing compared to Tasmania's Aboriginal heritage, staying on this property still felt like stepping back in time.

Portraits on the walls, the original stables, and even a blacksmith's forge, all made me wonder about the people who had lived on the property and farmed the land surrounding it.

Enjoying the amazing view of the valley surrounding the South Esk River, and Ben Lomond in the distance, I also wondered about the connection of Tasmanian Aboriginal people to this land.

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OUTLOOK: Visiting this beautiful farming estate was like travelling back in time. The large homestead was full of reminders of the past, while the surrounding views also sparked the imagination.

Tiger snakes are found in most **Tasmanian** habitats including offshore islands

On mainland Tasmania, tiger snakes can reach a length of 1.8 metres.

Tiger snakes are an important predator of introduced

rodents.

Once born, baby tiger snakes have to fend for themselves.

**Chappell Island** tiger snakes can grow to 2.1 metres.

**Despite** their name, many tiger snakes do not have any stripes.

> WHAT have you learnt during the school holidays?

Plenty, no doubt, but is there something that stands out?

Perhaps you visited a learning destination, or a new location and discovered some facts you didn't know

A member of out team discovered first hand that Tasmanian Tiger Snakes are very good swimmers.

He already knew they could swim, but he didn't realise how well.

He was part of a group who watched three tiger snakes cross a river in the Northern Midlands, all in the space of about 10 minutes.

The snakes glided swiftly along the surface of the water, with their heads held high.

All the snakes were a safe distance away, and upon hearing a bit of a commotion from the humans ducked underwater for a moment, before reemerging closer to the river bank.

It makes sense that tiger snakes are good swimmers, given they are often found in watery environments.

They like to eat fish, frogs and tadpoles, and can stay underwater for at least 9 minutes searching for prey.

They are also excellent climbers, which is unusual for elapids (a family of snakes which have permanently erect

fangs at the front of the mouth). They will climb a tree to a height of 8 metres to raid a bird's nest.

There was a time when it was believed there were two species of tiger snakes the Eastern Tiger Snake and Black Tiger Snake, while Tasmanian Tiger Snakes (Notechis ater humphreysi) were recognised as one of several sub species.

But scientists now believe there is just one species (Notechis scutatus) that varies greatly in size and colouration.

As you would be aware, tiger snakes are more active in summer, and their venom is highly toxic.

They sometimes will bite if threatened,

and are therefore best avoided. However, tiger snakes are quite shy and timid, and will generally try to avoid

The best thing to do if you encounter a snake is to stay well clear and let the snake go its own way.

If bitten, call 000 and seek medical attention immediately.

The recommended treatment is a broad bandaged applied firmly over the bite as soon as possible.

Further bandaging should begin at the fingers or toes of the bitten limb and extended upward to cover as much of the arm or leg as possible to slow the movement of the venom.

### Step back in time for family fun

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I also considered bushrangers, because I have read the area was a feared haunt for the gangs of escaped convicts.

I started doing some research to find out more, and have already discovered some really interesting facts about the history of the property and the area generally.

For example, I now know how the estate got its name, and that a pardoned convict established the farm and built the homestead.

Going somewhere new is always a learning experience.
