
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# A positive start to the year

# Steps toward sustainability

The final piece of the puzzle in Launceston's Inveresk campus expansion is complete. The Shed recently had a set of beautiful SDG stairs unveiled - rainbow steps dedicated to all 17 of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals.

The Shed accommodates 160 staff and 1,500 students across health and science disciplines and has been built with strong sustainability principles at heart, including recyclable materials, Tasmanian timber and energy efficient services. While the SDGs are already embedded across the University of Tasmania curriculum, now they are also a colourful part of the landscape.

The Shed is linked with the rest of the Inveresk campus via the laykila/North Esk pedestrian and cycle bridge.



# Innovation Award for UTAS Enviro Society A new app that allows users to log their low-emissions commutes to work or uni has recently attracted an exciting accolade.

Grantees in last year's City of Hobart Youth Climate Action Fund program, the student-led Environment Society developed the Commute4Climate app, and gave out prizes to the biggest walkers, cyclists, bus catchers and ferry takers!

Over just one month, participants' mindful transport choices prevented more than 1,000 kilograms of carbon dioxide being emitted into the atmosphere (compared to car use).

#### New food gardens blooming on campus

The newest additions to our edible campus mission have recently sprouted at Rozelle and the Medical Sciences Precinct (MSP) in Hobart.

In an initiative involving a UTAS Green Impact team, the Healthy MSP group and Viridi Tas, supported by the City of Hobart's Youth Climate Action Fund and the University of Tasmania's Sustainability team, more than 30 staff and students came together to make the beautiful MSP courtyard garden happen.

The University's Community Garden Coordinator, Jeff McClintock, helped to install a number of new wicking beds and plant everything from spinach, peas and coriander to tomatoes, strawberries, blueberries and apples. The courtyard garden is also home to some very healthy sunflowers, planted for mental health week in October 2024.

Students and staff are already heading out there to pick veggies and herbs to add to their lunch. Student Emily Walter says, 'the new garden space is a lovely place to relax and soak up the sun between classes'.

Plans are in the pipeline for Nutrition students to host a food literacy program in the garden but in the meantime, UTAS staff and students are encouraged to forage, harvesting only mature produce, of course!
