There were two things that Elvy Robertson knew to be true: an education was essential and that girls can do anything. Her beliefs left an indelible mark on her daughter Bonnie Tilley.

This led Bonnie to leave a gift in her Will that will continue her legacy of helping generations of young Tasmanian women achieve their own educational aspirations.

Bonnie said her mother's beliefs were backed by lived experience. Elvy had to leave her home on the West Coast of Tasmania to study in Hobart, before training to become a teacher. Bonnie remembers her mother encouraging her to pursue a tertiary education, a formative experience she recalls fondly.

She established the Bonnie Tilley Scholarship for Tasmanian Women to give students, particularly from rural areas, the chance to study at university.

Bonnie said it was "absolutely magic" to hear scholarship recipients say how amazing it was to have someone they don't know support them. Already Bonnie is seeing her legacy come to life, with 10 students supported by her scholarship.

The foresight of retired nurse Ruby Menzie fast-tracked medical research into some of the most common and chronic diseases affectina Australians.

Before Ruby passed away, aged 89, she left a gift in her Will to the Menzies Institute for Medical Research at the University of Tasmania.

The gift was matched by the University to create the Ruby Menzie Scholarship in Population Health Research, providing six postgraduate students with the opportunity to research health challenges from osteoarthritis to mental illness.

The impact of her gift continues to reap rewards.

Many of the scholarship students she supported have careers committed to realising her vision of improving the health of the community through research or clinical care.

Ruby knew what it meant to have someone believe in you. It was only thanks to a scholarship that she was able to achieve her own dream of becoming a nurse.

Her family said Ruby was a selfless individual and her gift was an example of her generosity and commitment to the Tasmanian community and medical research throughout her life.

How to leave a gift to the **University of Tasmania in your Will**

1. Contact us

Leaving a planned gift to the University is a very personal decision. Whether you would like to establish a fund in your name, anonymously, or in the name of a loved one, our experienced staff in the Advancement Office are here to help direct your gift to the area that means the most to you. It would be our privilege to help you. All conversations are private and confidential.

2. Seek legal advice

Your state or territory Public Trustee can provide advice and can help you find a solicitor. Will-kits to prepare your own Will are available online or from a newsagency or post office, however it is recommended you talk to a legal advisor before drafting your Will to ensure all legal requirements are met.

3. Talk to your family and loved ones

Sharing your intentions with your family and friends will help them understand and realise your wishes in the future. This can reduce the burden on your loved ones to make difficult decisions about the distribution of your estate.

4. Let us know

If you have included the University in your Will or intend to, please let us know. You can choose to remain anonymous, but finding out about your intention and hopes for the future can help us work with you to realise your gifts potential. It assists with future planning and allows us, with your consent, to personally thank you in your lifetime.

There are different types of gifts in Wills:

Specific or pecuniary

You are giving the University something specific that you already own. This may include a fixed amount of money (pecuniary gift) or assets such as real estate, artwork, jewellery or shares.

Residual

Your gift to the University comes from the funds and property remaining in your estate after all debts and expenses have been paid and all specific and pecuniary gifts have been disbursed.

Percentage

The gift is a percentage of your total estate, enabling your estate to be shared amongst people and/or organisations without stipulating amounts. This takes into consideration that the value of your estate may change.

Whole estate

Your gift to the University is your total estate. This type of gift can achieve transformational impact and is often nominated by those who have no living family member or other beneficiaries.

Wording your Will

We recommend you use the following statements of intent:

a. Specific sum of money or asset

I give and bequeath to the University of Tasmania ABN 30 764 374 782, [the sum of \$........]/[the following item of my property and effects] to be applied for general purposes. The receipt of an authorised officer of the University of Tasmania for the time being is sufficient discharge to executors and trustees.

b. Percentage of estate

I give and bequeath to the University of Tasmania ABN 30 764 374 782, [.......%] of my estate to be applied for general purposes. The receipt of an authorised officer of the University of Tasmania for the time being is sufficient discharge to executors and trustees

c. Whole of estate

I give and bequeath to the University of Tasmania ABN 30 764 374 782, the whole of my estate to be applied for general purposes. The receipt of an authorised officer of the University of Tasmania for the time being is sufficient discharge to executors and trustees.

d. Establish/support an endowed scholarship

I give and bequeath to the University of Tasmania ABN 30 764 374 782, the sum of [\$.......] to be endowed and the income of such fund to be perpetually applied for support of/the establishment of University scholarships and bursaries. The receipt of an authorised officer of the University of Tasmania for the time being is sufficient discharge to executors and trustees.

What to do if you already have a Will

If you already have a Will you can still support the University by adding a codicil, a legal provision that explains, modifies or revokes a Will. For advice on writing or amending your Will, it is recommended you consult a solicitor, trustee or accredited Wills and estate specialist.

If you would like to confirm a gift in your Will from outside Australia, please contact us.




Honouring a loved one

Few people know the human body like a pathologist. But even after more than four decades helping diagnose, detect and monitor disease, highly respected pathologist Dr John Bothman was shocked to discover he was sick.

"The first time I noticed something wasn't right was when we went out to dinner with friends at the Bellerive Yacht Club. When we left I was looking for our car and couldn't find it," Dr Bothman said. He turned to his wife and declared that his car must have been stolen.

"She said we didn't come in vours, we came in mine."

Dr Bothman was shocked when a brain scan revealed changes in his brain consistent with dementia. The 72 year old will retire in early 2022 after a distinguished medical career, including working at the Launceston General Hospital, Hobart Pathology and a large private practice in NSW.

He wants his legacy to support Tasmanian medical research, and recently updated his Will to include gifts to both the Menzies Research Institute and Wicking Dementia Research and Education Centre.

That's why Dr Bothman wants to support neuropathologists, who conduct neuroscience research, to make medical advances that will improve our understanding of dementia.
