

Academic Senate Planning Day – 7 December 2023 Report to 1 March 2024 University Council Meeting

The following major items were considered by Academic Senate at its 7 December 2024 Planning Day:

Universities Accord – Student Support Policy

The Chair and Prof Martin Grimmer (acting Pro Vice-Chancellor, Student Equity and Success, and Pro Vice-Chancellor, Academic Excellence), guided Senate through a planning session in relation to the requirement emanating from the Universities Accord that higher education providers must have, and comply with, a policy that addresses the support that will be provided to their students, in order to assist students to successfully complete the units of study in which they were enrolled. Prof Grimmer stated that UTAS support the idea of a student support policy, but have expressed concern over the deficit nature of the compliance approach to support, noting that a single policy may not be the best tool. Senate were advised that there were no guidelines around the requirement and so institutions were trying to structure their response based on the information in the Amendment Bill. Senate were advised that the Government would accept a policy framework with embedded policies that were available to students, and that UTAS may try to construct an externally facing website as the single source of truth. Senate discussed the advantages and disadvantages of externally facing websites versus internal intranets, and the challenges that were present due to the speed at which the new requirement was expected to be implemented, noting the main focus needed to be that students should know where to go to get help. The Vice-Chancellor expressed the desire to respect what the Government had requested, but to give them something better than what they would expect. Senate split into groups to further consideration this matter. Feedback from the groups (which is summarised in the Minutes) will be collated and Prof Grimmer will incorporate it into the final policy solution.

Academic Capability Framework

Prof Martin Grimmer presented to Senate on the Academic Capability Framework, which he advised would provide a clear and consistent guide for academic staff and managers on the capabilities and outcomes for success across core areas of academic activity. Prof Grimmer shared the ecosystem of processes that impact academic performance and success, noting that they all relate to one another and feed back into each other. These processes included: academic performance; role clarity and work allocation; probation, promotion and achievement; career development and planning; academic capability; and performance and probation expectations. Prof Grimmer stated that currently there was a lack of understanding which led many academics to ponder whether they were ready for a promotion or not. Senate were informed that the aim of the Academic Capability Framework was to support, promote and enhance academic performance, noting that the Framework would be developed and tested now and into 2024 through ongoing consultation, with the final amendments, approval and implementation scheduled for mid-2024. Senate split into groups to further consideration this matter. Feedback from the groups (which is summarised in the Minutes) will be collated and Prof Grimmer will incorporate it into the next iteration of the Framework.

Self-Review of Academic Senate in 2023

Senate were asked to complete the annual Self-Review of Academic Senate. The Chair advised members that Dr Hawkins, as Associate Chair of Senate, would be inviting all level A, B and C members to get together in the new year to discuss opportunities for enhancing their role and experience on Senate. The Chair reminded members that the External Review of Senate would take place in the first quarter of 2024 and that the outcomes of that Review would feed back into Senate. The Chair also mentioned the positive response to the recent Governance Workshops run by the Chair and the Director, Governance and Compliance, noting that they would continue to spread the message in relation to good governance across the University.
